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WHO CAN APPLY

Applications for these funds will only be accepted from Board members or Committee Chairs of the Venice Neighborhood Council.

The application requires the listing of a Project Manager. This is the Board member or Committee Chair who will be responsible for the day-to-day implementation and supervision of the project. The duties include the proper completion of all invoices and support materials and the submission of them to the Program Administrator for payment. A Board member may not submit an application for a project or serve as a Project Manager for a project if they have a potential conflict-of-interest relationship with any of the vendors.

WHAT CAN BE APPLIED FOR

Community improvement projects must provide a demonstrable benefit to the Venice community. They should build community through the implementation process and enhance the neighborhood once complete. Projects may encompass a wide range and can include, but are not limited to: The Arts, Beautification, Community Support, Public Safety, or Education. The Department Of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) has the final discretion to determine whether or not the proposed project is clearly beneficial to the community

A project may be submitted that is part of a larger project, but if so, it must be able to be completed independently of the larger project and regardless of whether other funding needs to be secured.

All projects must conform to the funding guidelines of the Department Of Neighborhood Empowerment. When submitting an application ask yourself the following questions:

- Is this for program services (i.e. after school program, graffiti removal, etc.)?
 - o If for a select group of individuals, the applicant must create a fair selection process to establish participants
 - o Effort should be made to secure the best prices from competitive bids
- Is this for equipment and supplies?
 - o Equipment and supplies can only be used for the benefit of the community
 - o Equipment can not be turned into private property. Purchases intended for private and/or paid use are not allowed.
- Is this an event?
 - o Events must be open and advertised to the public
 - o There should not be an admission charge
 - o Discuss appropriate liability issues





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All Community Improvement Projects must be completed within one year of the VNC Board's vote to approve funding. Funding will only be valid through this date; thereafter, approval for the funding shall expire.

All projects and publicity must credit the Venice Neighborhood Council for its support.

Applications may not be simultaneously submitted if the applicant has an application pending before the Neighborhood Committee as part of its competitive selection process for Community Improvement funds.

USE OF FUNDS

Community Improvement funds can only be used to pay for materials, supplies and services directly related to the implementation of the project. All funds are payable by the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment to be billed by a vendor <u>following</u> the completion of a service and the submission of an invoice. Invoices must be billed to the Venice Neighborhood Council and submitted to the Program Administrator. They will be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Venice Neighborhood Council who will then review them and forward them to DONE for payment.

Services may be performed by an organization or sole proprietor provided they have a City of Los Angeles Business License (B.T.R.C.) and a Federal Taxpayer ID number. Reimbursement to third parties is prohibited; payments must be made directly to the vendor that provides the service. If required, DONE will contract directly with the service provider using a City of Los Angeles approved contract. The service provider must agree to all terms and conditions contained therein.

The funding is entirely conditioned upon compliance with DONE's Neighborhood Council Demand Warrant Guidelines and Neighborhood Improvement Project policies, procedures and limitations and DONE's subsequent approval of such funding (see DONE website -- www.lacityneighborhoods.com).

Necessary licenses, permits and/or tax identification numbers shall be presented to the Venice Neighborhood Council prior to the commencement of work.

In addition, project budgets may not: include line items for:

Work performed managing the project Administrative salaries An organization's operational expenses Ongoing maintenance expenses Purchases prior to the award notification Any item not included on the submitted budget sheet Transportation Equipment that will become the property of the applicant





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APPLICATION REVIEW PROCESS

The number of projects funded overall will be determined by the amount of applications received. Every effort will be made to share the money as equitably as possible throughout the Venice community.

Applications will be reviewed by the Board Of Officers of the Venice Neighborhood Council. The Board is comprised of people from the Venice community and is elected by Venice stakeholders. The Neighborhood Council Board will select applicants for funding at one of its regularly scheduled public meetings. Applicants will be notified of the Board's decision within 14 days of the meeting and the final decision will be posted on the VNC website (VeniceNC.org).

REVIEW CRITERIA

Applications will be reviewed based on the following criteria:

- 1. The **budget** is realistic, appropriate, and supported with quotes.
- 2. The organization or individual is **capable** of completing the project.
- 3. The work plan is detailed, specific, and feasible.
- 4. The project is **supported** by the involvement of the community.
- 5. The **number** of Venice stakeholders that will benefit from this project.
- 6. The project implementation process will **build community**.
- 7. The complete project will enhance the community.
- 8. The **application** overall is clear and logical.

- The application packet is not to exceed 25 sheets. Submittals beyond the 25th sheet will be discarded.
- The packet dimensions should not exceed $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches. Fold large inserts.
- Applications should not be submitted in decorative folders.
- All letters of support and supplemental materials **must** be submitted with the original application.
- When including attachments, number them sequentially and place them behind the corresponding application sheet. For example, 2.1, 2.2, 2.3 etc.

Applications cannot be added to or modified in any way after submission without the approval of the Program Administrator.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION SHEET

PROJECT DESCRIPTION (Include how many stakeholders will be working on this project.) (Maximum 500 words)

SPARC is currently expanding its artist studios and workshops spaces to continue our work in promoting wellness and community cohesion through the arts. We are requesting support from the Venice Neighborhood Council to maintain affordable artist studios and upgrade our spaces to increase capacity for in-person, outdoor, and virtual community workshops. In the last year, SPARC has grown its public programming and artist residencies to address a shortage in studios for visual artists. During the current public health crisis, SPARC has launched ongoing and multi-week virtual arts programs for the community, including Yoga + Dream Lab on Zoom every Tuesday and a 6-week Chicano Folklórico and costume making course for families. All of our virtual programs during COVID-19 are donation-based in an effort to remain responsive and accessible to diverse audiences in Venice and across Los Angeles.

Since 1976, SPARC projects and programs have leveraged the arts to build strong communities, address critical social and political concerns, and promote wellness. We currently exhibit works by local, national, and international artists in the Duron Gallery at SPARC. Critical spaces for programming also include: a 675 square foot multipurpose workshop and exhibition space called the Red Room that is used by artists and community groups; a 350 square foot Printmaking Studio led by artist Kay Brown; the innovative SPARC Digital/Mural Lab, which creates large scale murals and artworks (most recently the Venice Bridge Housing digital mural project led by Francisco Letelier, Michael Brunt and Patrick Marston); an outdoor space for community programming, including Mercado at SPARC, an event featuring over 25 local artists and makers that coincides with the Venice Art Crawl, and; a newly established 836 sq ft Ceramics Lab that will accommodate short and long-term artist residencies, ceramic-based public artworks, and low-cost in-person or virtual workshops for community members. SPARC's artist studios create opportunities for artists and programming for Venice residents and families. This strengthens our local economy by providing art fabrication capabilities and promoting local artists and makers. Art productions and programming will be critical to the recovery of the creative community after COVID-19.

Current artists-in-residence include Kay Brown in the Printmaking Studio, who leads workshops both at SPARC and on school campuses through our K-12 arts education program, and Kristina Kotlier in the Ceramics Lab, who will begin to lead in-person and virtual ceramics workshops through SPARC this year. SPARC also provides artistic residencies for emerging and established artists in the Digital/Mural Lab, a research, education, and mural production studio that provides public art services to artists to create large-scale, socially engaged public artworks. With support from the VNC, SPARC will be able to upgrade our studio spaces to build capacity for our artists-in-residence to lead innovative workshops at SPARC or through digital platforms for artists of all ages across Venice and Los Angeles, a particularly critical resource for community wellness during the current public health crisis.

The Social and Public Art Resource Center is leading a larger long-term plan to improve our capacity to serve public audiences and to build a cohesive vision with our neighbors in the Venice Arts Complex (Beyond Baroque and Pacific Resident Theater) in order to expand offerings for the Venice community. Beyond this grant, SPARC is also seeking funding to paint the building, improve the indoor/outdoor flow between the Venice Arts Complex, and develop an artist coffee bar. The project outlined in this proposal addresses the most immediate needs of artist studios in order to increase studio functionality and sustain our public-serving capacity.

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COMMUNITY BENEFIT (Description of benefit to the entire community and justification for these benefits):

Our proposal for improvements to artist studios and workshop spaces at SPARC will enrich arts and culture in Venice and create new opportunities for artists and residents. Artists-in-residence will have the unique opportunity to create work within a vibrant arts community where they can propose gallery exhibitions and sell their artworks in the <u>SPARC Shop</u>. The creative culture and infrastructure of SPARC supports artists by promoting their work and practice, creating exchanges and opportunities amongst themselves, providing opportunities through SPARC's other community programs and projects, and providing opportunities to meet local Venice neighbors through workshops and events. SPARC is committed to maintaining and advancing virtual arts programs during this time of physical distancing by developing digital content by artists-in-residence in their artist studios at SPARC.

Funds from the Venice Neighborhood Council will in part:

- **Increase** the capacity of artist studios and workshop spaces for in-person and virtual programs, making them more suitable for the local community to take advantage of art offerings, exhibitions, and events.
- **Develop** new programs out of the Digital/Mural Lab, the Ceramics Lab, and Printmaking Studio at SPARC.
- Improve public spaces with electrical and lighting upgrades.
- Maintain access to affordable workshop and artist spaces for local artists.
- Activate the arts on each floor of the SPARC Building creating a vibrant and creative synergy between all artists and studio spaces.

SPARC has historically collaborated with Venice partners to create and restore public artworks, including the *POW/MIA Vietnam Veterans Memorial* supported by the Venice Chamber of Commerce, Venice Neighborhood Council and Councilmember Mike Bonin, and *Endangered Species* by Emily Winters with support from the Venice Arts Council Endangered Art Fund and local neighbors. We curate exhibitions and programs that engage Venice artists, residents, and families in the arts, including our bi-annual Mercado at SPARC in collaboration with the Venice Art Crawl and ongoing life-drawing and printmaking workshops. The studio spaces for artists at SPARC is integral to our artistic mission and it provides a critical solution to the displacement and deterrence of artists within Venice while also ensuring that Venice residents and families have access to creative resources in the neighborhood and virtually. Your support is integral to helping SPARC sustain and advance our artistic programs and collaborations with Venice artists and residents, ensuring that the legacy of Venice as an arts community continues for years to come.

PROJECT PLANNING SHEET

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WORK PLAN (Include a TIME-LINE for the project with beginning date and completion date of each phase)

Our work plan for implementing the studio improvements is divided into three phases: phase 1 will focus on electrical upgrades and lighting in workshop spaces, artist studios and public areas while the center remains closed. The expansion of our virtual programs will begin with the purchasing of materials and creation of take home kits for online workshops. Our studio improvements will take place in areas that will not interfere with the workshops. The second phase will involve exterior upgrades to better host open air mercados that comply with social distancing and COVID-19 reopening guidelines. The third phase will occur much later in the grant period, which will aim to start promotion of in-person outdoor activities.

All programs will remain donation-based or low-cost. These improvements are an integral step towards utilizing the full capacity of the SPARC building as a site of culture and creativity in Venice.

Timeline:

- Phase 1: June 2020 to August 2020
 - Electrical upgrade in second floor artist studios.
 - Develop virtual programs and acquire materials and supplies for pickup
 - Begin promotion and outreach, schedule first workshops in July and August
- Phase 2: August 2020 to October 2020
 - Install posts and aircraft cable for retractable awning.
- Phase 3: March 2020 to May 2020
 - Depending on COVID-19 guidelines, begin scheduling and hosting in-person public programs.
- Project Completion June 2021
- Assessment (Ongoing): Models for assessment will include collecting the number of artists and community members served annually through residencies, community workshops, and pop-up events in the Ceramics Lab with subcategories that focus on local audiences.

Please note that SPARC is considering the current physical distancing protocols related to COVID-19. We intend for the Ceramics Lab, Printmaking Studio, and Digital/Mural Lab at SPARC to have the capacity for virtual workshops and programs through Zoom or alternative online platforms that can begin during infrastructural improvements. This will ensure that arts workshops are still accessible to the Venice and Los Angeles communities during this unprecedented time of physical distancing.

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COMMITTEE MISSION (Explain the Committee's mission and how this project will advance it)

The Social and Public Art Resource Center (SPARC) has fostered meaningful partnerships with artists and residents across Venice and Los Angeles since 1976. Our mission is to produce, preserve, and promote activist and socially relevant artwork; to devise and innovate excellent art pieces through participatory processes; and ultimately, to foster artistic collaborations that empower communities who face marginalization and discrimination. SPARC is home to the Durón Gallery, the Digital/Mural Lab (D/ML), the Mural Resource and Education Center (MREC), and the Red Room, a multipurpose gallery and workshop space. For the past 43-years, SPARC has also remained steadfast in our commitment to making studio spaces available to artists and creatives at affordable rates. Within recent years, this has become a key part of our effort to continue the vibrant legacy of Venice as an arts community. The independent artists and organizations housed in the building often become a part of the creative culture within SPARC and Venice. The Argonaut recently featured artist Kay Brown in their Venice Stories segment, who has been creating work and leading low-cost workshops for community members in the SPARC Printmaking Studio since 2008. In 2019, SPARC welcomed over 2000 guests for free or low-cost arts programs including Sip and Sketch life drawing workshops with models that represent the diversity of Los Angeles, Big Brothers at SPARC, an open mic night and throwback to 1970s gay bar Big Brothers on West Washington Boulevard (now Abbot Kinney Boulevard) in association with our Tomboys exhibition by Christina Schlesinger, and our <u>17th annual Día de los Muertos</u> celebration and Nahuatl ritual. SPARC is a dynamic center for the arts and we are passionate about continuing to develop our programs and facilities to better serve artists and residents across Venice and Los Angeles. We respectfully request support from the Venice Neighborhood Council to upgrade artist studios and workshops spaces, increasing our capacity to service local audiences through in-person and virtual programming.

Judith F. Baca, Co-Founder and Artistic Director See resume attached.

Judith Baca is a Professor Emeritus at UCLA in the Chicana/o Studies Dept. & World Arts and Cultures Dept. Baca is a painter and muralist, monument builder, and scholar who have been teaching art in the UC system since 1984. She was the founder of the first City of Los Angeles Mural Program in 1974, which evolved into a community arts organization known as the Social and Public Art Resource Center (SPARC) which has been creating sites of public memory since 1976. She continues to serve as its Artistic Director and focuses her creative energy in the SPARC Digital Mural Lab, employing innovative digital technology to create social justice art. Baca's public arts initiatives reflect the lives and concerns of populations that have been historically disenfranchised, including women, the working poor, youth, the elderly, LGBT and immigrant communities. As the Artistic Director, Baca is the lead artist on The Great Wall of Los Angeles and oversees all projects and programs produced through the Digital Mural Lab.

Carlos Rogel, Executive Director See resume attached.

Carlos Rogel is an interdisciplinary media/mural artist, Executive Director at the Social and Public Art Resource Center (SPARC), and a doctoral candidate at UCLA's Department of Chicana and Chicano Studies. His research and art practice in community development focuses on arts-based methods of collaborative design and activism at the SPARC Digital Mural Lab. He develops community-based public art projects, arts education programs for K-12 LAUSD schools, and activist art interventions with immigrant rights and labor organizations. His arts-based dissertation focuses on the extension of The Great Wall of Los Angeles. His extensive research





on the ecological and social history of marginalized people will serve as the basis for the prisms examined in the development of the 60s and 70s of The Great Wall. He is skilled in coding and is currently publishing augmented reality content that interacts with the public and visual artworks.

Davida Persaud, Programs Manager See resume attached.

Davida Persaud is the Programs Manager at SPARC and a doctoral student at UCLA's World Arts and Cultures Department. Davida oversees the growth of public programs at SPARC and the K-12 arts education program, which engages youth in traditionally underserved neighborhoods by exploring identity, culture, community, and local histories through art. As Programs Manager, Davida also contributes to building lasting partnerships with local community organizations through arts education, public programs, and arts mobilization initiatives. Davida's academic research focuses on the community-based processes and pedagogical frameworks that emerged at SPARC out of The Great Wall methodology, and its application in K-12 education and public programs today.

Jeff Edwards, Digital Mural Lab Technician

Jeff Edwards is a visual artist focusing on digital photography. His extensive experience in photography and printing has been a vital resource for SPARC. He is a certified printing technician and oversees all gicée prints. As a skilled technician and photographer, Jeff will act as the lead in documenting and digitizing outcomes of the community-based processes that will inform the extension of The Great Wall.

Josel Cruz, Digital Mural Lab Artist

Josel Cruz is a trained graphic designer and web developer who has over ten years experience in the field. He plays an integral role in the development of SPARC's web presence and digital content. As a Digital Mural Lab artist, he works closely with Judy Baca to develop designs for digital mural commissions. Josel will play a key role as part of the creative design team in the technical support of composing imagery and designs, and in the collaboration and presentation of artworks for audiences. He is a coder, musician, and content creator.

Pilar Castillo, Archivist/Rights and Permissions/Copyrights

Pilar Castillo has fourteen years of experience in the field of Public Art and Arts Administration. As Publications Manager, she has facilitated the exposure of Los Angeles mural images featured in exhibitions, and in a variety of international print and media. Her primary focus has been in maintaining SPARC's unique and unsurpassed collection of mural images and documentation, and facilitating the publication and exhibition of SPARC collections worldwide. Additionally, Pilar provides training in related archival projects to graduate students in the field of Museum and Library Science at UCLA.

Samantha Magaña, Administrative and Development Associate

As the Administrative and Development Associate, Samantha Magaña assists in the coordination and logistics of the SPARC facility and operations. She has been involved in many of the current projects at SPARC by facilitating community workshops and conducting research. She will offer administrative and development support as needed. Samantha also supports social media and engagement, and will facilitate public communications on programs and projects.

Rayven Armijo, Executive Assistant

Rayven Armijo is a Los Angeles based performance artist and arts educator. She has been a part of SPARC's art education program as a teaching artist since 2016. As the Executive Assistant to Judy Baca, she supports





the Digital Mural Lab's administration. Rayven is one of the lead instructors for the 6-week virtual Chicano Folklórico courses for families, focusing on movement and expression at home.

Cristina Girod, Studio Assistant

Cici Girod is the Digital Mural Lab studio assistant, currently working on research for two upcoming SPARC and Judy Baca murals. She is a visual artist and freelance graphic designer. She graduated from UCLA in 2017 with a B.A. in World Arts and Cultures, and was a previous Getty Foundation "Multicultural Intern" for SPARC. Cici is one of the lead instructors for the 6-week virtual Chicano Folklórico courses for families, focusing on costume making and visual arts at home.

Artist in Residence: Ceramics Lab at SPARC

Kay Brown

Kay Brown (b. Eugene, Oregon) is an academically trained printmaker, graphic designer and community activist. 


