LAND USE AND PLANNING COMMITTEE STAFF REPORT April 14, 2010



SYNOPSIS: Regarding the Intersection of Palms and Lincoln.

As requested by VNC President, Mike Newhouse, LUPC is to take public comment, deliberate and send recommendation for action to VNC Board of Officers April 20, 2010 regarding a proposed 4-way traffic light system at this intersection which includes relocating two (2) bus stops and left turn lanes.

Traffic light system to be proposed and cost-shared by both CalTrans and LADOT. CalTrans, LADOT, CD11, and representatives from Senator Oropenza's office and Assemblemember Lieu's office are asking for community support for this traffic sign array.

This intersection has been the scene of killings, maiming, and injuries of all degrees for decades. A grass-roots swell of anger arose from surrounding stakeholders late last year. They had witnessed altogether too many human fatalities and injuries over the years. Emails were sent to VNC Board and LUPC pleading for remedies. Attached to this report is a compilation of emails dating from December, 2009.

Thirty (30) emails asking that this intersection be rendered if not harmless, at least easier for pedestrians to negotiate across. Only one stakeholder disapproved of signage at this intersection. All public testimony, verbal, email, postal, to be included in report to VNC Board of Officers, CD11, CalTrans, LADOT, other governmental agencies. Please see APPENDIX III.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: This intersection currently has two (2) bus stops, four (4) crosswalks, with destination commercial on each corner: STAPLES, Lincoln Hardware, Lincoln Fabrics and 7-11 Convenience Store. Palms does not go directly across the intersection, but "dog legs" across. One block north is a traffic light at California and Lincoln. Several blocks south is a traffic light at Superba and Lincoln.

APPENDIX I

Description of improvements to Palms and Lincoln Boulevard Intersection in Venice, California, as per CalTrans and LADOT

Accidents involving pedestrians on crosswalks are a common cause of road injuries and fatalities. In order to further enhance the safety and operation of the marked crosswalk at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard (State Route 1) and Palms Boulevard in Venice, we have recommended the interim and long terms improvements.

The interim improvements consisted of the following's and were completed in January 2010.

- Repainted the crosswalk and installed diagonal (Ladder) pavement makings in the crosswalk to provide sufficient warning for both motorists and pedestrian traffic approaching of this marked crosswalk.
- Upgraded the pedestrian warning signs on both northbound and southbound approaches.

Background:

The intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and Palms Boulevard East and West (approaches) are jogged intersections and has a complex geometry. For the best interest of public safety, the following long term improvements are proposed and the viable alternative will be selected when the support of the community of Venice is obtained.

The Long term improvements would be consisted of the following's.

- 1. Placement of the in-roadway warning lights and pedestrian actuated flashing beacon signals for both northbound and southbound approaches on Lincoln Boulevard at Palms Boulevard. These improvements could be designed and built by the State Department of Transportation (Caltrans).
- 2. Restricting the northbound Lincoln left turn movement to westbound Palms Boulevard. As interim solution until the permanent solution is implemented, we are proposing to restrict the northbound left turn movement to westbound Palms by placement of restricted left turn signs facing northbound traffic during peak periods.
- 3. In addition, restricting the westbound left turn movement onto southbound Lincoln and eastbound left turn movement onto northbound Lincoln during peak periods by placement of restricted signs on Palms Boulevard.

Placement of in-roadway warning lights and flashing beacons on Lincoln Boulevard approaching to Palms Boulevard may have some advantages and some disadvantages.

Advantages are as follows:

- Placement of in-pavement warning lights and flashing beacons may improve drivers' awareness of crosswalks and pedestrians who are present in them.
- After the installation of it lights, motorist yield behavior increases; that is, more drivers stop or slow down when pedestrians attempt to cross the road than before the warning lights were present.

- The speed near crosswalks also would decline after in-roadway warning lights are activated.
- In-pavement flashing warning lights would increase the conspicuity of a crosswalk when a pedestrian is using it.

In a complex and jogged intersection such as Lincoln and Palms Boulevard the placement of the inpavement lighting and flashing beacons may not achieve all the safety concerns as expressed by the local community of Venice.

- The left turn movements from northbound Lincoln onto westbound and from southbound Lincoln onto eastbound Palms would still be operating in un-acceptable level of safety, because of the roadway geometry unless these turning movements are permanently restricted.
- The meaning of the lights could be unclear to motorists and pedestrians alike. In some cases, pedestrians, who could use the lighted crosswalk, they do not and instead they cross elsewhere on the road.
- It may be difficult for pedestrians to know whether the lights are on or not, and drivers may not know what to do when the lights are flashing.
- Some drivers may slow but would still continue across the intersection in front of a pedestrian, while others may stop and wait for the lights to stop flashing, even when no pedestrian is present.

The installation of full traffic signals on Lincoln Boulevard at Palms Boulevard (at east and west approaches) would be the long term improvement and could be the viable alternative if it is supported by the community of Venice.

The process to implement the installation of full traffic signal would involve the following's.

- Requires the local community's support.
- Requires the City of Los Angeles Council's District support.
- Requires funding contribution by the City of Los Angeles Department of Transportation (50% by LADOT and 50% by Caltrans).

Recommendation:

Caltrans will schedule accelerated project delivery, for the proposed traffic signal, at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and Palms Boulevard, for the year 2011/2012 fiscal year. The remaining element of work necessary to achieve project delivery are the preparation of the cooperative agreement negotiation, execution and approval, preparation of project report and project plans.

It was suggested at the recent public meeting by the Caltrans that the city of Los Angeles may become the lead agency to install the signal under a Caltrans permit. Caltrans would then reimburse the City for the State's share of the cost, under a Caltrans-prepared cooperative agreement. In the interim, until the Council District 15 course of action, Caltrans will proceed with other the draft cooperative agreement under the existing accelerated project delivery scheduling.

APPENDIX II Synopsis of Proceedings

Background,

On November 18, we received email note from the Office of Hon Council Member Bill Rosenthal forwarding his constituents concerns regarding the pedestrian accident at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard (SR-1) at Palms Boulevard in Venice. They indicated that the major issue at this intersection is the pedestrian's assumption that traffic can and will come to an almost stretching halt in order to allow them to cross the highway. We were asked to investigate upgrading the crosswalk upgrading them with embedded lights/yellow striping/caution signs (similar to the flashing signal on Victoria and Lincoln crosswalk).

CalTrans responded to the Office of Hon Council Member Bill Rosendahl and expressed its sympathy and indicated that we were saddened about the traffic accident that occurred at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and Palms Boulevard.

A comprehensive traffic engineering study at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and Palms Boulevard was conducted in response to the community concerns over pedestrian safety. As result of that study, we recommended repainting the crosswalk and installing diagonal (Ladder) pavement makings in the crosswalk to provide sufficient warning for both motorists and pedestrian traffic approaching of this marked crosswalk. Further, we recommended upgrading the pedestrian warning signs on both northbound and southbound approaches. These improvements were completed in January 2010.

We secured additional traffic accident data at this intersection and revisited the safety and operation of the pedestrian safety and reviewed the accident data, as result of this study, and in order to further enhance the safety and operation of this intersection, we recommended long term improvements. These additional long term improvements would be either installation of pedestrian actuated traffic signal or installation of traffic signal.

We look forward to continue working with the LADOT staff, Neighborhood Council, local community and the City of Los Angeles Police Department (Western Division) in improving the safety and mobility of Lincoln Boulevard in Venice. This is in response to your email in which you expressed concerns about safety of pedestrian crossing Lincoln Boulevard (SR-1) at Palms Boulevard in Venice. You have indicated that the major issue at this intersection is the pedestrian's assumption that traffic can and will come to an almost stretching halt in order to allow them to cross the highway. Also, you expressed that yesterday, a woman was killed in the crosswalk on Lincoln Boulevard at Palms Boulevard. You have asked to investigate upgrading the crosswalk with embedded lights/yellow striping/caution signs (similar to the flashing signal on other crosswalks).

We are saddened to hear about the traffic accident that occurred at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and palms Boulevard. We have completed a comprehensive traffic engineering study at the intersection of Lincoln Boulevard and Palms Boulevard in response to community

concerns over pedestrian safety. As result of this study, we recommended to repaint the crosswalk and install diagonal (Ladder) pavement markings in the crosswalk to provide sufficient warning for both motorists and pedestrian of the approaching of this marked crosswalk. Further, we have recommended upgrading the pedestrian warning signs on both northbound and southbound approaches. We anticipate these improvements to be completed in two months. We are now in the process of securing additional traffic accident data at this intersection in order to update our records. It will take us one month to receive these records and update our analysis.

We look forward to continue working with the LADOT staff, Venice Neighborhood Council, local community and the City of Los Angeles Police Department (Western Division) in improving the safety and mobility of Lincoln Boulevard in Venice. I have been a citizen of Venice since 1972 when I purchased my house on Palms Boulevard.

The street which is unusually long between Penmar and Lincoln has seen many changes and has always had traffic issues due to it's length. The intersection where Palms meets Lincoln is a troublesome corner. Pedestrians cross Lincoln and Palms where there are no markings to help them make the journey across safely, nor are there yellow lines or blinking lights to remind motorist that it is a well traveled corner and they should slow down and consider the pedestrians. Three of the corners have businesses that bring in pedestrians and the fourth has a hardware store a few yards south of the corner. Lincoln Boulevard is a highly traveled street where traffic moves very slow. I grew up in the Palisades in the 60's and 70's, walking in the middle of residential streets, and never even worrying about cars stopping when I crossed Sunset Blvd at a crosswalk. I knew that "pedestrians have the right of way," and felt this law was sane, just and must be self-evident. Now I'm 48, and though I feel the same way, it's clear to me that a large minority of drivers either do not know the law, or do not feel it is particularly important to obey. They must think: "Cars are bigger and more powerful. Let the little things like pidgeons and humans get out of the way. I'm going somewhere!"

For the last two and a half years, I've lived at 1048 Palms Blvd., just East of Lincoln with my girlfriend, who has owned a house here for about eight years. She is scared to cross Lincoln at Palms, even at the crosswalk. I always reassure her, stepping off the curb when there's plenty of time for cars to stop. Unfortunately, what I've deemed enough time is not always enough for drivers intent on cruising along (pedestrians be damned), and we've had to pause, letting monomaniacal drivers speed by, or stop suddenly, irate because we continued to cross. Now, with this latest serious pedestrian accident, I'm a little scared too.

Won't you please install a flashing pedestrian crosswalk light, so all the people East and West of Lincoln who use this intersection won't have to fear for their lives every time they cross the street? Now that the problem is so painfully obvious, I'd hate to hear of another accident.

Another thing the city council might consider: promoting the rights of pedestrians through billboards that read, "Pedestrians have the right of way...always! That's the law." Something along those lines would reinforce what many in their driving exam pass over lightly (or may even get wrong and still pass the test). Peoples' lives (both pedestrians and drivers) do not have to be ruined by more senseless accidents.
