PENALTY WARNING:

Any person who violates or causes or permits another person to violate any provision of the Los Angeles Municipal Code (L.A.M.C.) is guilty of a misdemeanor which is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1000.00 and/or six (6) months imprisonment for each violation. Section 11.00 (m) L.A.M.C.

APPEAL PROCEDURES:

There is an appeal procedure established in this city whereby the Department of Building and Safety and the Board of Building and Safety Commissioners have the authority to hear and determine err or abuse of discretion, or requests for slight modification of the requirements contained in this order when appropriate fees have been paid. Section 98.0403.1 and 98.0403.2 L.A.M.C.



NON-COMPLIANCE FEE WARNIN

A proposed noncompliance fee may be imposed for failure to comply with the order within 15 days after the compliance date specified in the order or unless an appeal or request for slight modification is filed within 15 days of the compliance date.

If an appeal or request for slight modification is not filed within 15 days of the compliance date or extensions granted therefrom, the determination of the department to impose and collect a non-compliance fee shall be final. Section 98.0411 L.A.M.C.

NOTE: FAILURE TO PAY THE NON-COMPLIANCE FEE WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER THE DATE OF MAILING THE NOTICE, MAY RESULT IN A LATE CHARGE OF TWO (2) TIMES THE NON-COMPLIANCE FEE PLUS A 50 PERCENT COLLECTION FEE.



JACKIE LEE WAUKEEN COCHRAN, R.I.P.

Jackie Lee Waukeen Cochran, the restless, intense singer-guitarist best known for rockabilly classics "Hip Shakin' Mama" and "Ruby Pearl," was found dead, apparently from a heart attack, at his Toluca Lake apartment on Sunday, March 15. Cochran, who entertained at Santa Monica's Gaslite club on and off for the last four decades. was a pure product of America's Southeastern musical culture. Born on February 5, 1934, in Dalton, Georgia, by age 12 Cochran was playing guitar with local country bands. After making an early-'50s guest appearance with Hank Snow, he was invited by M.C. Slim Willet to join Willet's Abilene, Texas, country music revue, which led to work on Dallas' Big D Jamboree stage show. In 1955, he relocated to Mississippi, playing in rough backwoods "blind pig" juke joints, but after he saw Elvis Presley perform at New Orleans' Ponchartrain Beach, Jack the Cat was born, In short order, he was back on the Big D Jamboree, where his manager defined this new persona in shrewdly iconographic terms, constructing a 7-foot-tail wooden black cat with flashing red light-bulb eyes - one of rock & roll's earliest set pieces - that stagehands rolled out every time Cochran took the stage ("I hated the damn thing," he said, "but it sure was effective").

He made his first records, for indie label Sims, in Dallas, but by 1957 the Cat was in Los Angeles. Assisted by legendary A&R man "Uncle" Art Satherley (the first to record Bessie Smith, Bob Wills and Gene Autry), he signed to Decca. With his new single, "Ruby Pearl," getting substantial airplay, Jack was poised to become "the next Elvis and all this crap." but he'd forgotten about his manager back in Lexas. Threats of a lawsuit derailed his career and Jack quit the music business entirely for several years. He appeared briefly with Marilyn Monroe in Let's Make Love and re-emerged in 1962 to cut "Georgia Lee Brown," a searingly moody piece of rock & roll mysticism (covered by the Cramps in 1985).

A key force in the '70s Rollin' Rock stable, by 1986 Cochran had returned to the Gaslife, the bar where he'd sporadically worked since the early '60s; he routinely packed the joint until unexpectedly quitting last month. Cochran, an unpredictable, othery and passionale than, was also one of took & rook most distinctive stylists, and now, hopefully, has found the peace that always score of the stable to meet to

Visit to Townhouse recalls days of speak-easy

hen Orson Welles filmed "Touch of Evil" on the street outside its door, the Townhouse was nearly 40 years old. Perhaps Welles and the film's lead, Chuck Heston, even had a beer there. Memories of the past are still present at Venice's oldest bar and nightclub.

The Buzz: With its minimal outdoor signage, the Townhouse tends to get lost in the historic block of buildings on Winward Avenue just up from Venice Beach, and overshadowed by the popular (and much younger) jazz club across the street, St. Mark's Place. But to the regulars — and those in the know — this is the joint to hang out in.

The Roots: We're talkin' preProhibition here. Established in 1915, the Townhouse is one of Southern California's oldest watering holes, according to Frank Bennett, proprietor for the last 30 years. And during the original "Just Say No" to alcohol era of the 1920's, it was, predictably, a speakeasy, aided and abetted by the then-secret tunnels beneath the establishment used to spirit in the spirits and, presumably, the patrons.

The Look: Historic dive. The small lobby leads into a long, beige-colored room with high ceilings and a well-stocked bar running the length of the lace. A pseudo-tudor motif on

the walls and ceiling seems to tie into the bar's name.

The room widens to the back to include a few pool tables and a CD jukebox. Downstairs is a large, low-ceiling room, painted black and dimly lit with year-round Christmas lights.

Reportedly, the walls are original murals of Venician scenes. A bit funky and musty, this is probably where the tunnels led, but now it makes for the perfect venue for the Townhouse's occasional live entertainment. Tables, chairs, banquettes, a temporary bar and a stage area sit ready.

The Clientele: Locals, original Vénice homeboys, trend-eschewing bar-hoppers and fans of the bands when they perform. The staff is exceedingly colorful and friendly as well, especially Richie, the straightoutta-Noo-Yawk bartender who will regale you with stories on virtually any topic — and by the way, did he tell you about the underground tunnels?

Where There's Smoke: Outside, where it belongs. This isn't a "smoke-easy" for the late '90s. Sometimes laws are worth obeying.

On-Tap: Nothing ... usu Normally, beer is available from the full bar only in ounce bottles or 16 ounce with labels like Bass, Steinlager, Guinness, Beck's and Miller Lite.

But, in a special temporary promotion called "Brews & Blues," Culver City's own Angel City Brewing Company is offering three of its tasty wares on draught (ale, lager and hefeweizen) on Saturday evenings when bands, like the blues beltin' Terraplanes featuring Sweet Willie Tate, rock the house — or at least the basement — and no doubt resonate through the tunnels.

Mark The Date: Saturday night is the last of this initial phase of Angel City "Brews & Blues" evenings at the Townhouse, with affable, award-winning brewmeister Michael Bowe on hand to pour his beers and pour forth about the wonders of home and craft-brewing. A spicy, Cajun rhythm and blues soundtrack is provided by the Zydeco Party Band.

Suggestion: Given some folks' (usually unfounded) fear of venturing into Venice at night (despite valet parking availability), the Townhouse might consider continuing the worthwhile "Brews & Blues" concept on Saturday and Sunday afternoons to attract the beach crowd.

FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES

Effective Harch 1, 1977, any establishment proposing to engage in the sale for consumption on the premises of alcoholic beverages, including wine and beer, will be subject to a recent amendment to the Municipal Code requiring the filing of a Conditional Use application with the Office of Zoning Administration.

As provided for in Section 12.24-F of the Municipal Code, any property being lawfully used for this purpose on March 1, 1977, will be considered a deemed-to-be-approved Conditional Use and such a business can be continued, but is subject to review and approval of plans by a Zoning Administrator for any additions or alterations to the building which would constitute expansion of the use on the site.

Deemed-to-be-approved Conditional Use status will also apply to those establishments which were only temporarily closed and not lawfully engaged in such a business on March 1, 1977, when all of the following criteria are met:

- (1) The lawful sale for consumption on the premises of alcoholic beverages was conducted at that site between the period of March 1, 1976 and March 1, 1977; and,
- (2) The premises has not been utilized for any other use since the temporary termination of the sale of alcoholic beverage use; and,
- (3) The establishment has continued to be equipped and furnished for the conduct of the business of sale of alcoholic beverages for on-site consumption.

NEW ESTABLISHMENTS


Except as specified above, any property which has not been used for the lawful sale of alcoholic beverages for on-site consumption prior to March 1, 1977, and proposes to establish such a use on or after that date, will be required to file a Conditional Use application with the Office of Zoning Administration. This requirement applies whether or not a license from the Alcoholic Beverage Control Agency was approved or issued before March 1, 1977, or whether or not building permits were issued prior to March 1, 1977, or the building is under construction on that date. For new establishments, deemed-to-be-approved Conditional Use status will be achieved only if the actual lawful sale of alcoholic beverages began prior to March 1, 1977.

I've been going over a myriad of documents in search of anything relating to the downstairs. Of course it being a speakersy means it was "off" the radar for most of the time, at least during prohibition times and beyond. However, I think you may be pleased

with what I found.

My parents purchased the bar on July 15th, 1972 from Robert Otto and Gustav Hinkelman. Their monthly lesse payment was \$400. a month. On June 17, 1976 escrow was opened with a \$1,000, check for the purchase of the entire building. I found a grant deed dated September 22, 1976 to Ronald P. Bennett and Annie M. Bennett, husband and wife as joint tenants from Lucile Ballantyne, Gustav Hinkelman, and Robert Otto, a married man. I'm sure all are deceased but I do know Gus know a lot about the history of the place.

I ran across a copy of the original diagram my purents provided to the A.B.C. for the Townhouse. It is dated April 5, 1972. There is no mention of the downstairs beaument in this document though.

However, I did run across a letter from the A.B.C. and dated January 6, 1982, which confirmed approval for expansion from the original floor plan. Unfortunately, I haven't been able to locate that perticular sketch in any of the paperwork. I do know that from the original sketch they removed the original office and opened up the basement at this time. What is extremely significant about this particular document is that on the other side of it, in my mother's handwriting, is written "Approval of expansion of premises to basement." So, in theory, A.B.C. should have that updated sketch of the basement at they did approve it back in 1982.

I enclosed a copy of the old Fire permit that used to be behind the bar. It is dated May 1989 and lists an occupancy rating for the first floor as 75. I applied to change all of the permits (Dance Hall, Café Entertainment & Shows etc.) on 11-10-2004 with final approval coming on 02-09-2005. I recall when I paid all of the fees the clerk told me that they suttomatically sent notice to the Fire Department so they could update their information. Obviously this never happened and I subsequently forgot with all the hectic days that followed. You can see that I had been current up until that time, except I tried to change everything over from my parents name to the LLC.

Enclosed too is an Application to Altar, Repair, Move, Or Demolish permit dated February 11, 1935 (right after prohibition ended in 1933). This permit describes the following work to be done "Construct two stairs to basement as per plans and declumreadable] and other minor repairs." Under the heading of owner it shows a "M. Hume and Atwood"? Maybe these folks were the contractors doing the work? So, the city was aware of the basement and apparently approved the construction of the stairways and other remodeling.

Lastly, I found a Altar, Repair, Move, Or Demolish permit deted, so it appears, May 28, 1958 in the name of John C. Menotti, more than likely the son of Cesare Menotti. Nothing too significant other than it appears this is when they split the bar, which used to occupy the entire first floor into two separate areas, a bar and a restaurant.

I hope some, or all, of this information helps.
