Expanding the capabilities of the school garden space brings with it the potential for greater community interaction, through gardening lectures by local resident

for greater community interaction, through gardening lectures by local gardening experts, master gardeners, and community volunteers. A vibrant garden space may also help to draw more parental involvement to the campus, through the opportunities provided by the garden.

In addition, excess produce may be donated to local food banks or homeless shelters. This would be following in the example set by The Learning Garden, located just down the street at the Venice high school, which donates hundreds of pounds of produce annually.


The Mark Twain Middle School Garden Club will expand their gardening capabilities with the purchase of many new tools and gardening supplies. These new tools will allow for more students to be engaged in the process of growing and benefiting from the many fruits and vegetables the garden space has the potential to produce.

The goal of the Mark Twain school garden is to facilitate the creation of a vibrant green garden space, allowing for the possibility of daily interaction with students, who are engaged in an outdoor curriculum closely connected to the indoor curriculum. Such a curriculum may include cooperation with many community groups such as the California School Garden Network, LA School Gardens, the Junior Master Gardener program, the Time For Lunch Campaign, the Farm to School campaign, interaction with the Venice High School Learning Garden program and students, among many other dynamic partnership possibilities.

Garden activities will be incorporated into classroom instruction, as well as through an after school component. Through use of the garden, students will be exposed to the responsibility required for proper care and maintenance of plants. Additionally, garden activities can provide an opportunity for students to practice social and cooperative skills necessary for a garden to flourish. Students, teachers and community volunteers can take pride in knowing they are beautifying the campus for all to enjoy.


Topics that may be integrated into the outdoor space and covered by the teaching faculty and community volunteers may include:

• <u>scientific studies</u>, including:



- botany
- seasons and the sun
- o weather
- o pollination
- life cycles
- o insects and animals
- water cycles and watershed
- foodsheds
- o soil and geology

• mathematical studies, including:



- o measurement of plant growth
- o germination rates
- o cost/benefit analysis of water and energy use, and other factors
- o geometry (which may have arisen from marking land for agricultural use)

• <u>cultural studies</u>, including:



- o historical food uses and patterns around the world
- o plant based industry and crafts
- o the direct experience of various plant based foods through cooking

• artistic studies, including:



o drawing and painting from life in the garden

pure physical experience, including:



- o tactile learning through sunshine, wind, water and soil
- outdoor exercise

Beyond the school based curriculum, students will also have access to a whole range of horticultural skills required to maintain a vibrant garden space including:

- sowing seeds
- caring for transplants
- composting
- building garden beds
- watering
- weeding
- fruit tree pruning
- harvesting
- proper tool care

Emphasis is also placed on demonstrating the value of a healthy diet and outdoor exercise in the garden with the goal of helping to prevent issues such as diabetes and maintaining a healthy weight. There currently is great support for this aspect of school gardening coming directly from the White House, through Michelle Obama's White House Victory Garden, with curriculum being developed at the highest levels in cooperation with regular visits from school children in the nearby area.

WORK PLAN (Include a TIME-LINE for the project with beginning date and completion date of each phase)

If granted community improvement funds, we would begin purchases as soon as funds were dispersed, to have all tools in place for use at the start of the 2010-2011 school year. Construction of seed starting tables would be completed by September 2010. Seeds would be in hand to use for the Garden Club by the start of the school year.

Efforts are already underway by several teachers to use the resources currently available, to begin the project of integrating the garden into various curricula. Community volunteers have also begun a dialogue with students pertaining to the various topics surrounding food and gardening, as well as discussing ways of increasing community and parent participation within the school. With access to more tools, we will be able to expand these efforts in a meaningful way.

We will begin to utilize the new tools by creating fresh garden beds and compost piles, and also by starting our own transplants from seed, to be planted into the garden when appropriate. We will also use the drip irrigation to water the garden in a very water wise and efficient manner, keeping overall water use as low as possible.

MAINTENANCE PLAN (If applicable)

All tools and supplies will be kept in a designated tool storage room to protect against wear and tear from the elements, and to prolong the life and use of said tools. The current storage room is directly adjacent to the garden space, to allow for easy access by the students and volunteers.
