PROJECT DESCRIPTION (Include how many stakeholders will be working on this project.) (Maximum 500 words)

At least five times a year, 826LA organizes five-week workshops that aim to introduce students to the basics of journalistic craft and engage them in writing as practiced in that profession. The workshops are taught by journalists and culminate in the publication of *The Venice Wave*, a newspaper that documents a community concerned with the sharing of ideas: life and society, literature and culture, law, civil responsibility, and local news. This year, the focus of the workshops will be residents and/or stakeholders in Venice who are connected to one of the categories listed above. 826LA has relationships with a number of Venice locals and we will contact them to participate in the workshops. Such individuals include Judith Baca, world famous muralist and founder of SPARC, Jodie Evans, cofounder of Code Pink, and Melissa Mathison, a local Venice resident and screenwriter for E.T. and The Black Stallion.

Throughout the project, students will benefit from one-on-one tutoring with 826LA's staff and volunteers. During early meetings, students will develop a skill set in researching, interviewing, reporting, fact-checking, writing multiple drafts, editing, and reviewing. They will work with volunteers to fine-tune a distinct journalistic voice, learn how to observe and report without bias, and to produce and submit stories for the publication deadline. The effect of these weekly workshops on both the individual skill level of the students, and the quality of the paper overall, will be cumulative, with each session building on the techniques practiced during prior workshop meetings. Over time, stories will become more polished, and students will write with enhanced clarity and a greater sense of personal style. As the workshop progresses, students will learn to work collaboratively as they form a newspaper "staff" and learn to organize themselves and work towards publication goals. Approximately 50 Venice stakeholders will be working on this project and 1,000 copies of the newsprint versions of *The Venice Wave* will be distributed to Venice residents, businesses and other Venice stakeholders.

At the conclusion of each workshop, *The Venice Wave* will be published in print form and digitally as *The Venice Wave* blog. *The Venice Wave* blog will be an online project with a teaching and feedback-gathering role. The online version will contain the stories that go to print alongside occasional video footage, podcasts, digital photography, and other new media that serves an instructional purpose for students with a long-term interest in journalism. 826LA is seeking support for the five journalism workshops that will be held from July 2010 through June 2011. Unlike previous publications of *The Venice Wave*, this year we would like to publish three issues on newsprint. The majority of the funds we are seeking are to cover the cost of printing *The Venice Wave* on newsprint. Each publication of *The Venice Wave* will be celebrated with a release party that will be held at Venice venues.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT (Description of benefit to the entire community and justification for these benefits) Approximately 1,000 copies of *The Venice Wave* will be printed on newsprint at the conclusion of three of the workshops and digital versions of all issues will be uploaded to 826LA's website, www.826la.org, which is accessed by approximately 70,000 people each month. The newsprint versions will be distributed to local families, schools, businesses, and community centers, plus friendly media outlets that will join with 826LA as partners to distribute student work packaged within their own periodicals.

The student population at our Venice site is predominantly Latino and few speak English at home. Most of our students attend low performing schools in the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD). The LAUSD currently has the highest student-to-teacher ratio in the nation and has suffered some of the most dramatic budget cuts. As a result, teachers are burdened with overcrowded classrooms and are forced to focus their efforts on raising test scores. 826LA strives to help alleviate some of the burdens that Los Angeles teachers have to bear by offering one-on-one assistance both inside and outside of the classroom. The journalism workshop will provide invaluable assistance to students who come from families that do not generally have the financial resources for private writing tutoring.

The Venice Wave's structure will be a collaboration between adult teams who will organize ahead of successive project deadlines:

- **Designers**: Supervising layout, representing the students' work with the highest possible standard of professionalism, and making the final publication accessible to the audience. Our designers come from both web and print backgrounds.
- Writing tutors: Engaging students in writing, in publication assignments that require content identification, research, drafting, and revision.
- Workshop leaders: Finding resources for the project to enhance its
 presentation, recruiting special guest volunteers to offer students interviews with local experts or
 instruction in specialized reporting.

The journalism workshops will be on four-week writing cycles, followed by a week of design-intensive focus; after that, students will take an evaluative look at the news reporting they've done and decide what changes could make a more compelling future publication. The print publication layout is an original template, but content-wise overlaps slightly with the blog.

The first issue of *The Venice Wave* will be published in August 2010 and approximately every six to eight weeks thereafter throughout the year.

826LA is a nonprofit organization with locations in Venice and Echo Park. Our Venice site is located in the historic SPARC building, a decommissioned police station that houses arts and writing organizations. 826LA is dedicated to supporting students ages 6 to 18 with their creative and expository writing skills and to helping teachers inspire their students to write. Our services are structured around the understanding that great leaps in learning can happen with one-on-one attention and that strong writing skills are fundamental to students' future success. With this approach and objective in mind, we provide in-school tutoring, assistance with student publications, after-school tutoring, after-school workshops, and help for English language learners. 826LA has a long history of successfully executing projects similar to the one proposed in this Application. Our instruction is based on the proven pedagogy of project-based learning, rooted in the conviction that teaching is most effective (and most fun) when it is centered around the execution of a project, whether that be a newspaper full of student stories and interviews, a chapbook full of poems and stories, or a CD full of just-written songs.

To Whom It May Concern:

I have lived in Venice since 2005 and have been volunteering at the 826 writing center in Venice since 2006. I moved to Los Angeles after several years in the Bay Area, where I volunteered with the 826 writing center in San Francisco. My experience volunteering, both in the after school program and most recently in the year-old journalism program, have given me a much broader understanding of how necessary it is to have additional resources convenient to students' homes and schools that give them a safe place to write and learn.

Schools make up the backbone of any community, but since I'm not a parent I have little interaction with the local educational system. Volunteering at 826 has given me a huge amount of insight into the successes and shortcomings of local schools. There are students at 826 from many different backgrounds, a wide range of educational resources at home, and a variety of types of schooling, including home school and private schools as well as the magnet and public institutions. Having a place beyond the classroom with volunteers who are accomplished in their fields and can spend one-on-one time with students can make a huge difference.

In the journalism program, students generate story ideas to create a monthly newspaper by and for young people in the neighborhood. They have interviewed Venice residents and covered topics ranging from the Green Dot charter school program to marble championships, from the Twilight book series to the benefits of vegetarianism to local skateboarding legends. Regardless of how difficult my day at work was or how tired I am, I never regret dropping my baggage at the door and spending a few hours a week with this group of students. They are motivated, savvy, and have great ideas they want to share about what's going on in our community.

Thank you for considering 826 West for a grant. They are a hugely deserving organization and I am grateful to have them as part of the Venice community.

I'm writing in support of the grant proposal 826LA has submitted. I have lived in Venice just a mere three and a half years but in this time I have tried to involve myself with the community as much as possible. I've come to VNC board meetings and have sat on the Vehicular Living and Homeless Committee with some of you, but before my involvement with the VNC I got involved with another Venice community organization - 826LA. I've been involved with 826 for a little over two years now and to give you a brief description of the organization they work with children 6-18 with their homework, reading, and a variety of creative projects focused around writing.

About a year ago 826, a group of kids, and a couple of volunteers (me being one of them) started a newspaper, The Venice Wave. It was started to offer a new perspective that the Beachead, the Argonaut or the Santa Monica Mirror didn't have; one from youth. Over the last year we taught the children the basics of journalism had them write articles and got them to become more involved in community issues. Community issues is an underlying theme we try to convey to each and every kid. 826 is located in Venice and most of the kids who are involved in the paper are from Venice so our main beat is Venice and its surrounding areas. Eight papers later the kids have covered a wide variety of issues. Some serious issues involving their schools and community to an interview with a professional yo-yoer.

With the grant proposal 826 is putting forward we can actually create a «real» newspaper, lifting the production quality to somethings kids and the readers can get excited about.

Dear Venice Neighborhood Council,

As an 11-year resident of Venice, I've known my neighborhood both before and after 826LA set up shop in the old police station it shares with SPARC. In its five years on 685 Venice Blvd., its effect on the community and its local students cannot be overstated.

I signed up as a volunteer the week it opened, and in under a month, my life and my connection to Venice were irrevocably changed for the better. Getting to know the students of my neighborhood was to know my neighborhood for real, alerting me to the needs and concerns of Venice's younger residents and inciting new responsibilities as a neighbor, voter, and volunteer.

It was clear from the beginning that local school kids would use every resource at 826LA's disposal, and while the non-profit quickly catalyzed a strong cadre of community-minded volunteers, its resources have always lagged behind the incredible demand. From the days of our first ambitious book project, I have seen many students' lives changed and new opportunities opened to them, simply through the help and attention of an adult in their community.

Since its first days, when 826LA began as a place where students from nearby schools came in the late afternoons for help with homework, interest from local students and teachers have evolved the non-profit into a weeklong cavalcade of workshops, in-school projects, and field trips. High school students have published fiction and received free college prep & SAT assistance. Elementary and middle school age kids have created a newspaper and are engaged by working professional journalists who volunteer on a weekly basis to abet the passion and skills of that vital and evolving trade.

In short, 826LA is not only engaging adults from Venice to participate in their community, it's helping create the next generation of community-minded adults, who one day, will remember these experiences and give back themselves.
